

The following article appeared in the Envol newspaper in March 2022:

"Water flow and beaver dams"

The MRC des Collines will work on the file internally

The MRC des Collines will create a watercourse intervention officer position that will allow internal management of all issues related to the flow of water on its territory.

This aspect is becoming increasingly important in the MRC des Collines, says Prefect Marc Carrière. Among the elements that this person will have to keep an eye on is the whole question of beaver dams and their effects on rivers and roads.

"The natural flow of water and beavers, for us, is a big issue." Marc Carrière

Until now, the MRC des Collines did business with an external firm to take care of this aspect. "It cost a lot and the service was so-so," says the Prefect. There was no follow up."

Faced with the importance of the issue, the MRC therefore decided to do the work internally. "What is the most advantageous, the most effective, is to do it ourselves," says Mr. Carrière.


Security

The prefect believes that this water management is essential for a territory like that of the Collines-de-l'Outaouais. "There are a lot of lakes, streams, marshes and there are no more trappers."


"The issue of cohabitation between beavers, resorts and residences is often difficult, he adds. There are a lot of complaints from citizens, with good reason."

It is also a question of safety for road infrastructures. Poor management of water flow and beaver dams could have impacts on some roads, says Marc Carrière."






Updated Map of the Lake

Power Outage

The following letter was written by the Association president was published on January 19, 2022 in the LowDown and was sent to the Federal and Provincial Deputies, the mayors of our two municipalities, the prefects and the councillors.

Power failure and its consequences

We understand that there will be a lot of improvement to the communications network by September 2022, but that is not soon enough. Starting on Friday, December 10, for many of us and for almost 48 hours, there was a major outage, which was very understandable given the circumstances.

Once again here at Lac Sinclair in East Aldfield, loss of power meant that <u>we did not have a landline telephone signal</u>, so no means of communication for many who do not have Internet and/or a generator to connect their Internet to be able to communicate. I know of several in my environment devoid of these necessities and it is heartbreaking to know that if there had been a medical or other emergency... guess the rest. Most importantly, <u>let's not forget</u>, <u>we do not have a cell tower</u>. This is absurd and unacceptable in 2021 almost 2022 and less than an hour from downtown Gatineau-Ottawa.

- Landline signal originates from small distribution buildings housing switching equipment, a battery and a generator located at the intersections of ch Cléo-Fournier and ch du Lac Sinclair, and ch des Pins and ch du Lac Sinclair.
- Power from Hydro Québec is converted to low voltage to send the telephone signal over telephone lines to nearby residences.
- Signal can be received by both cordless and corded telephone sets.
- When Hydro Québec experiences a power outage the system switches to battery power which typically lasts for approximately four hours or less.
- Cordless telephone sets go dead almost immediately; corded sets produce a dial tone for as long as there is power coming from the distribution system battery.
- When this battery goes dead, the generator should kick in automatically or a Bell technician is supposed to bring a portable generator to power the system.
- This typically never happens, and the customer is left with no means of contacting 911 or any other sources of help or support during a power outage which can last for days.

Conclusion: Many people in Lac Sinclair and the surrounding area do not have Internet or cellular access because there is no tower, AND no landline telephone because Bell is not present during a breakdown... Why is Bell not able to do better to provide landline telephone service to its customers in rural areas during a power outage?

Water Related Matters

Water testing

We will be testing for E. coli readings twice this season as per usual at 30 predetermined sites around the lake. The spring sampling will be done the week of June 6th while the end of season sampling will be done the week of August 29th. E. coli is measured to gauge the cleanliness of the water for swimming purposes.

Again this summer, the association will participate in a Provincial water testing program that aims to benchmark water quality and clarity across as many lakes in Quebec as possible. Samples will be collected in June, July and August and remitted to the province for testing with a focus on chlorophyll, phosphate and dissolved organic carbon levels which are the key drivers of water clarity and algae growth.

Safety buoys

An additional six safety buoys were purchased over the winter and will be installed in early May along with the others. Over the last three seasons the lake association has purchased 24 buoys with two extras as back up. In the future, damaged and/or faded buoys will be replaced on an as needed basis to ensure that we always have bright and easily seen buoys on the water at all times.

Water levels

The water level is measured bi-weekly (thanks to the efforts of Kevin Scott and Chantal Vaillancourt). These readings will be reported as usual in our fall newsletter.



Boat washing

The boat washing station is available for free the entire boating season in the parking lot at the Community Centre in East Aldfield across the street from the Ptit magasin général. It is very important that all boats, trailers and other vessels that have been exposed to other bodies of water (other than Lake Sinclair) are thoroughly washed prior to being put into our lake. Foreign invasive species are very prevalent in surrounding lakes and rivers and are easily transported to other bodies of water causing irreparable harm in many cases. There is no charge for using the boat wash and it only takes a few minutes to do. Be sure to pass this info on to your guests who may bring a boat or other water vessel with them when visiting.



Soap products, pesticides and fertilizer use

It is recommended to use biodegradable products that degrade in less than 30 days such as La Parisienne, Biovert and Attitude. These products are phosphate-free. Phosphorus-containing products increase the level of chlorophyll in the lake which in turn leads to increased algae and aquatic plant growth and reduced oxygen levels for fish. For those property owners with lawns close to the lake shore, please refrain from using pesticides and/or fertilizer as these products contain phosphorous and nitrates that are detrimental to lake water quality. It is recommended to retain a 15-to-20-meter buffer of natural plant life between your lawn and lakeshore.

Invasive Species

Letter received from the Ministry of Forests, Wildlife and Parks - July 2021

Hello,

The spiny water flea, an aquatic invasive species with a high potential for spread, was detected in the Ottawa River in the McConnell Lake area near Rapides-des-Joachims.

The spiny water flea can cause significant damage to aquatic fauna by modifying the food chain and can cause inconvenience to users of water bodies by attaching itself to boats, fishing equipment and any equipment that comes into contact with water.


Winter Trails
